LOVE & GRATITUDE

THE ORIGINS OF HUNTER'S MOTHER'S DAY SCHOLARSHIP CAMPAIGN

It started with a son's gift of love, then swelled into the gratitude of generations. When attorney **David Chapnick wrote** a \$25,000 check to the **Hunter College Foundation,** creating a scholarship honoring his late mother, Goldie Kraft Chapnick '30, he knew he had birthed a great idea.

The 2003 donation was noted briefly in the newsletter Giving at Hunter, but it had not yet hatched into the decades-long campaign that has raised almost \$11 million for thousands of Hunter students. Chapnick, who became a trustee of the Hunter College Foundation, pressed the idea with then-Hunter College President Jennifer J. Raab. Hunter, after all, had been a women's college for most of its more than a century of existence and had educated some of the most accomplished women in America many of whom had been the first in their families to go to college. Of course, their relatives would want to honor these beloved figures. He and President Raab sent solicitations to a core group of 400 families of devoted alumni.

The Mother's Day Scholarship Campaign also put a notice in the Spring 2005 issue of *At Hunter.* "Did your mother go to Hunter?" the headline asked, adding, "This Mother's Day, give your mother a gift that honors her Hunter heritage and gives a new generation of students the opportunity for a Hunter education."

One idea contributed by President Raab greatly interested potential donors: "Gifts of \$2,500 or more will be acknowledged in a special advertisement in *The New York Times* on Mother's Day."

The infant campaign grew quickly. Families and friends clamored to honor not only the mothers, but the sisters, aunts, teachers, friends, and many other women who had enriched their lives.

"From David's first gift, this extraordinary campaign has provided thousands of students with scholarships that enable them to pursue their education free from financial hardship," said Hunter College Foundation Executive Director Alexis L. Eggleton. "It has generated many new donors, both as word spread about the campaign, and as Mother's Day Scholarship recipients graduated, prospered, and have paid their success forward by becoming Mother's Day donors themselves."

Since its start, love, gratitude, affection, and reverence have powered the Mother's Day Scholarship Campaign year after year, leading to many repeat donations. The families of Joan Hansen Grabe '60; Klara Apat Silverstein '54, MA '56; and Ruth Newman '54 have donated repeatedly.

The list of donations will be studied for its insights into the history of Hunter College — and New York City.

For example, in 2010, real-estate developer and former Consumer Affairs Commissioner Bruce Ratner and former Parks Commissioner Henry Stern donated in honor of "our friend and mentor," Bess Myerson '45, the former

Miss America and consumer-affairs commissioner. In 2011, the owners of *The New York Times*, the Ochs and Sulzberger family, gave a gift in honor of Rachel Piexotto Hays Sulzberger, Class of 1878. Arthur O. Sulzberger Jr., the former *Times* publisher, still honors his great-grandmother Piexotto in the Mother's Day rolls.

Philanthropist Bruce Hoffman, a Hunter College Elementary School alumnus, embodies the notion of filial (and husbandly) piety. He has given Mother's Day donations in honor of his grandmother Belle Steinhardt, Class of 1903, and his great-aunt Rose Steinhardt, Class of 1905. In 2023, he named the welcome center at Hunter's Counseling & Wellness Services for his late wife, Dr. Perry D. Hoffman, who was not a Hunter alum.

It is these stories uniting the generations that have made the Mother's Day Scholarship Campaign such a special part of giving at Hunter.




Call them the "Little Lisas."

Mother of Dance at Hunter

AGDEP graduates keep learning and growing — developing a strong dance educator voice. The next generation of dance education leaders are right here.

When you grow up surrounded by creative, highly educated female relatives, you can't help but follow in their footsteps. That's how it went for Jody Gottfried Arnhold. Her mother and aunts were "Hunter girls" — strong women who were proud of their careers and who often reminded young Jody that their Hunter education had made their success possible.

"They talked about it all the time," said Arnhold, who grew up as the oldest of four in Washington, D.C.

The children all knew that their mother, Lenora Marcus Gottfried '35, had gone to Hunter in The Bronx, studied biology, and graduated at age 19 during the Great Depression. Aunts Ruth and Frieda Gottfried also attended Hunter in the 1930s and were lifetime educators in New York City public schools.

In fact, a phone conversation with her Aunt Ruth — a nursery school teacher at the 92nd Street Y in Manhattan (now the 92NY) — likely ignited Arnhold's career. As young Jody told Ruth all that she had learned in her dance classes, her aunt voiced the idea that Jody might someday teach dance at the Y.

She got that job and many others.

Often called the "Doyenne of Dance," Arnhold is an international luminary of dance advocacy and education. Not only did she teach dance for 25 years in New York City public schools, she would go on to create the Dance Education Laboratory (DEL) at 92NY in 1995. She's also a noted philanthropist, and a former chair and driving force in building the famed Ballet Hispanico. She also executive-produced an Emmy-nominated documentary about dance in public schools, PS Dance!, which features several Hunter alumni at work.

She's not a former dance educator, either; Jody continues to teach at DEL and in workshops across the country. (Her own degrees come from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, Laban Institute of Movement Studies, and Columbia University Teachers College.)

At Hunter — where she donates every year to the Mother's Day Scholarship Campaign in honor of her mother — she helped catapult Hunter College into New York's leading public school for the arts.

In 2010, she established the Arnhold Graduate Dance Education Program at Hunter, which offers graduate degrees in dance education as well as New York State pre-K-12 dance-teacher certifications. In 2018, a generous gift from Jody and her husband John enabled Hunter to refurbish "The Jody," a beautiful performance and laboratory space for the Department of Dance — which became a full-fledged department in part through her generosity. In 2023, Hunter honored Arnhold with a doctorate of humane letters.

"This studio is the cornerstone of the dance program at Hunter College," Arnhold said of the suite of spaces that function as a graduate "dance laboratory" for the rehearsal, performance, instruction, and study of modern dance. "It's the space that the program needed from the very beginning, and it's glorious. It's certainly exceeded any expectation."

The office suites and study space are wallpapered with symbols of movement. "This part is the Laban notation of a dance, of a duet," Arnhold said, pointing to the abstract figures. "And it's the greeting dance, which is kind of a classic."

Over the past 15 years, the Arnhold Graduate Dance Education Program has certified more than 160 teachers — most of whom teach at New York City public schools. "We haven't even begun to make a dent. We've done so much, and there's so much more to do," she said. "We've got to keep going to reach at least a million kids and a thousand schools."

Arnhold's program continues to develop organically, now offering a fast track for professional dancers, who often hold MFA degrees, to become certified teachers, and the Dance Education CLASS Leadership program, which enables certified dance teachers to step into leadership roles.

"They are going to be prepared and certified to be leaders in the field," said Arnhold, a staunch advocate of public education. She listed a few such positions: director of dance at the Department of Education, borough arts coordinator, principal, and assistant principal, adding, "We're going to flood the system with Hunter-educated folks because we're meeting them where they are."

At a time when the federal government is cutting funds for the arts, does Arnhold ever worry about a retrenchment of dance education?

"There are too many people that are going to make sure that we don't go back," she said. "I believe in public education. I believe in dance education for every child, and I think it should be the best. And I think Hunter's program is the best."

Dance education is "lifelong learning, and that's instilled in them" in Hunter's dance education programs, said Arnhold, sitting in The Jody with alumni from the program who joined her for a photoshoot for this publication. "Our graduates keep learning and growing, and many of them develop a very strong voice. Sitting here is the next leader."

The program doesn't limit itself to the classroom. Students this year went on a study trip to Cuba to learn Afro-Cuban dance and strengthen their Spanish, both of which will enhance their teaching in New York City schools. Arnhold also reflected on the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic and the use of new technologies in the dance classroom. Even though Covid disrupted much schooling, it taught the dance education world how to reach students online.

"Our reach is enormous because of the technology, the online presence — there's really no going back from it," Arnhold said. "Of course, in-person instruction is what we want; however, we want to reach everybody. Technology is helping us with that. It really creates access."

At the heart of Arnhold's long dance education career is her north star, providing dance for every child. As she declared: "We need dance education in every state to create citizens for democracy!"

MEET THE ARNHOLD DANCE PROGRAM GRADUATES

Ella Rosewood '16 and Michele Solares '19 epitomize the kind of public-school teachers the Arnhold Graduate Dance Education Program trains.

Rosewood teaches at PS 17 in Astoria, covering 3K through fifth grade, excluding kindergarten and first grade because of scheduling constraints. She holds dual undergraduate degrees in dance and elementary education from the University of Wisconsin Madison, where she first met Arnhold and received a scholarship to study at her Dance Education Lab over a summer.

Inspired by Arnhold, she moved to New York City to become a dance teacher after her undergraduate years, working at dance companies on their education programs before getting her master's.

Solares teaches preschool on the Upper West Side. "Movement is just embedded in the curriculum," she said. "Everything is a movement game."

She was teaching her charges the concepts of "reduce, reuse, and recycle" through movement and was looking forward to having a pint-sized Mardi Gras parade.

Puerto Rican-born Yasmar Airitza Cruz, a 2021 graduate of the master's program, is director of education and programs at Casita Maria Center for Arts & Education in The Bronx. Arnhold's Mother's Day Scholarship helped her after she moved to New York, allowing her to gain teaching certification even as she taught dance classes and performed with several companies.

Daniella Hernandez, a current program student and Queens College graduate, is inspired by the program curriculum.

Arnhold's Mother's Day Scholarship helps her pursue her dream career. "I have taught kids since I was 17 and just love dance, teaching, and children, and want to share my knowledge with the next generation," she said.

Choreographer Henning Rübsam teaches at Juilliard and Fordham University and recently received a New York State Council on the Arts grant. He travels the world for his career, with recent trips to Argentina and Greece and a festival in Corsica this summer. Even though Hunter's master's degree is geared to public-school teaching, he feels it has been a handy credential.

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HONORING A LIFELONG TEACHER

In a sepia photograph, 21-year-old Olga Leichter stands in a graduation gown and mortarboard before the old Park Avenue Hunter College campus. The year was 1927, and Leichter had just earned her degree in French. In November of that year, she got a teaching certificate that defined her life.

A native New Yorker, daughter of a large family in Manhattan and Brooklyn, Leichter (married name Graham) worked for many years as an elementary school teacher in The Bronx, teaching mostly inner-city third- and fourth-graders. After she retired and moved to southern California, she volunteered as a tutor with the Los Angeles School District. She believed in the promise of every child.

Olga Graham died at 98 in 2005, but her lifelong passion for

education lives on in her family's philanthropy.

The Graham Family Foundation began supporting the Hunter Mother's Day Scholarship Fund in Graham's honor in 2009.

The foundation was established in 2006 by Olga's daughter, Dorothy Graham, an MSW and retired hospital planner, and is managed by Olga's grandson Richard Straesser.

"Olga, in her essence, was an educator," said Straesser, a business student who said his grandmother taught him math, reading, and writing. "That's why our foundation supports education services in schools and scholarships for students."

Dorothy Graham said that her mother had many friends among her former Hunter classmates. They would take cruises together to Europe and Cuba during summer breaks. "She got her friendship group and her career at Hunter, and it basically set her path for life," Graham said.

Since 2009, the foundation has supported the education of almost 70 Hunter students.

There are five students in the 2004–25 Graham Scholars cohort: Brooklyn native Jonathan Harris, a film major; Chinatown resident Jessica Li, a computer-science major interested in web development and gaming; first-year student Sarah Mangione, from Saugerties, New York; Tristan Montañez, majoring in art history and art management; and Brooklynite Zuri Mothen, who is planning an arts major. All are Muse Scholars. Aimed at artistically talented and academically strong students, the Muse Scholar Program helps undergraduates take advantage of Hunter's exceptional arts programs, faculty, and resources.

Li, who has felt a bit unsure of herself compared to her peers, wrote to the Graham Foundation to say she would use the scholarship to sharpen her career goals. "I wasn't sure I could measure up to my friends in their passion or knowledge," she said. "Your Mother's Day Scholarship has given me the motivation to play catch up."

Mothen, the daughter of a single mother, said she has had difficulty funding her education and covering expenses. "Thanks to your generosity, I now have the opportunity to pursue my education without the heavy burden of debt after graduation," she wrote in a letter to the Graham Foundation. "Your support allows me to focus fully on my academic development."

Just as Olga Graham would have wanted!

HERBERT AND ROSE L. RUBIN: CHAMPIONS OF JUSTICE

Their love for each other and enthusiasm for helping others live on in the Hunter College Mother's Day Scholarship Fund.

When Herbert Rubin (CCNY '38) and Rose Luttan, HCHS '34, HC '38 met at New York University Law School, they knew they had found their soulmates. Children of East European Jewish immigrants, the 1942 graduates married and went on to become a mid-century legal power couple. The marriage, which produced three children, lasted 75 years.

Bronx-born and raised in the Yiddishist milieu of the Workmen's Circle, Rose treasured her Hunter education, which broadened her horizons beyond the tenements of Crotona Park North. Rose's mother had insisted that her daughters get as fine an education as any young man, observed Rose's daughter Caroline Temlock Teichman. Hunter delivered.

"Hunter helped her discover the greater American dream," said the Rubins' son, Don, who added that the college not only gave Rose an intellectual foundation and an interest in politics, but also the confidence and social skills to maneuver as a woman in the larger world.

Rose, who was one of only three women in her law-school class and an early female member of the NYU Law Review, pioneered roles for women in the state and city judiciary. She was one of the first few women named and then elected as a State Supreme Court judge, and the first named chief administrative judge of New York City's Office of Administrative Trials and Hearings, an independent court for city workers. A judge who cared about

people, she worked hard to improve the professionalism of her agencies and the prospects for women in the judiciary, noted her daughter Barbara Cooper. Herbert, a partner at Herzfeld & Rubin, served on the judicial-review committees of Senator Daniel Patrick Moynihan and his successors, as well on municipal judicial-review boards. He made sure that women candidates got fair treatment.

"He and mom worked hand in hand, each in their own universe, to make that happen," Don Rubin said.

Herbert was an early and avid supporter of Hunter's Mother's Day Scholarship Campaign. He and Rose endowed scholarships in honor of Rose and her younger sister, Esther Luttan Balsam '39, and left a bequest to the Mother's Day Campaign in their wills.

Rose died at age 99 in 2016. Herbert lived to age 105, working as a lawyer until he died in 2023.

"He adored our mother," Don Rubin said. "He wanted to honor her and the way she pulled herself up by her bootstraps and got through Hunter High School, Hunter College, and NYU with initiative and perseverance. He was happy each year to be able to support her achievements by contributing to the Mother's Day Campaign."
